Question: 12.5(i) Has the Council satisfactorily addressed the need for leisure and sporting facilities in Tring?

- 1. We would contend that the Council has not satisfactorily addressed the need for leisure and sporting facilities in Tring.
- 2. What we are trying to achieve is an acknowledgment in the Core Strategy that Tring has a need for significant extra space for sport in order to meet an exceptionally high (and growing) local demand and a current lack of facilities to meet that demand.

We are being thwarted by the inaccuracy of a key piece of evidence relied upon by Dacorum BC Strategic Planning in assessing leisure needs, a report delivered in October 2006 by a firm of consultants, Knight, Kavanagh and Page ("KKP"). This report provides the evidence base for a number of Dacorum's planning documents, including the 2008 Open Space Study.

Our own survey evidence, submitted to Dacorum BC on 23 September 2010 (see Appendix A), clearly demonstrates that the KKP report vastly under-estimated playing numbers and the demand for sporting facilities in Tring, while significantly over-estimating the amount of sporting facilities available in the town.

3. Responding to our earlier suggestion in respect of Paragraph 15.18 (Delivering Leisure Needs) that "the supporting evidence base to the Core Strategy should be updated, and the Spatial Strategy for Tring consequently amended, to reflect the actual (higher) need for open space and sports facilities in the town", Dacorum BC sees no reason for any change and claims that "current technical information is considered to be adequate to support the Core Strategy" (SUB 5, Report of Representations, Part 2, Table 2, Core Strategy Reference: Policy CS23).

The Council has however offered the following small addition of wording to the Core Strategy: "An active sporting community wants to promote indoor and outdoor sport. Investment, which helps to maintain facilities, provides appropriate new space and benefits the town, will be supported." (MC 91).

Whilst we appreciate the Council now recognise the active sporting community in Tring, and its need for special attention, the first sentence of the proposed minor change does not unfortunately acknowledge the level of current demand, and clouds the issue by suggesting that the clubs are trying to increase demand. It also fails to acknowledge the current shortage of facilities for current need and the parlous state of Tring Sports Centre. What is on offer is a mere sop to Tring's requirements.

4. Conclusion

- Paragraph 22, as it relates to sporting and leisure facilities, is "unsound".
- The paragraph fails the "justified" soundness criterion.
- The Tring Place Strategy flies in the face of the facts, unsupported by a robust and credible evidence base.

 In order to be sound, the Core Strategy should acknowledge the need for increased sporting facilities in Tring and accept evidence provided by Tring Sports Forum, which uses data derived from a physical inspection of facilities and membership numbers obtained directly from the sports clubs.

Add at paragraph 22.2 (The Vision): "meeting the demand from both the local community and local schools". Insert new paragraph 22.10: "A new or completely refurbished indoor sports facility (including a swimming pool and a full size outdoor astro-turf playing area) will be delivered to replace the existing Sports Centre facilities managed by Sportspace on Mortimer Hill, which are at the end of their serviceable life." Insert new paragraph 22.11: "New playing fields, primarily for community use, will be provided." Amend proposed amendment MC 91 to "A thriving and growing sporting community requires extra space for sports facilities to meet local demand. Investment, which helps to maintain facilities, provides appropriate new space and benefits the town, will be supported."

Question: 12.5(ii) Is Icknield Way the most appropriate location for new playing fields?

- 1. We would contend that Icknield Way is not the most appropriate location for new playing fields.
- 2. We would suggest that the following matter requires clarification. In its response (see page 68 of SUB 5, Report of Representations, Part 2, Table 2) Dacorum BC states that "the reference to playing fields under LA5 should remain". However, under proposed amendment MC 89, the Council proposes to *remove* the words "including playing fields" from the final sentence in paragraph 22.3, which would then read: "Tring will deliver around 480 new homes. This includes approximately 150 homes through a local allocation on the western edge of the town, together with affordable housing and new open space".
- 3. A number of reasons have already been put forward as to why land adjoining the proposed LA 5 housing development at Icknield Way is not the most appropriate location for new playing fields.

Whilst new housing obviously needs to be supported by additional open leisure space nearby, the Dacorum Sports Policy Statement that the Council will, where possible, enable clubs to manage sport and leisure facilities such as public courts and astro-turf provides a further reason as to why locating playing fields off Icknield Way would be a mistake. Additional playing fields required to support any increase in population would be better located where they can be effectively managed by local sports clubs, that is, at the eastern end of Tring.

4. Conclusion

- Paragraph 22 is "unsound".
- This paragraph fails the "justified" soundness criterion.
- The proposed location for these new playing fields is not "the most appropriate strategy when considered against the reasonable alternatives".
- In order to be sound, the Core Strategy should adopt the change outlined below.
- Delete at paragraph 22 LA 5 (Proposals Box): "playing fields and".

NB Although there were increases in playing numbers in most sports between 2006 and 2010, the increase was nowhere near as large as the variances apparent above. Furthermorer the numbers of facilities have hardly changed in this period. All of which would indicate that the commisioned report was wildly inaccurate and that DBC planners have been working with unreliable data.
