New Funding Website for Voluntary & Community Organisations

Funding Central will be the name of a new website to support voluntary and community organisations (VCOs) looking for funding opportunities. The website, funded by the Office of the Third Sector and managed by NCVO, will be **launched on 17th June 2009**. The website will provide VCOs with details of over 4,000 income opportunities, focusing on grants, contracts and loan finance from government and government non-departmental bodies and agencies, local and regional government, charitable organisations and foundations, and the EU. It is hoped that the website will be an interactive site providing a one-stop shop for information and advice about grants and contracts.

The website will be launched in two phases. Phase 1 (comprehensive grant funding, contract and loan finance information portal) will be launched on 17th June with Phase 2 (information portal populated with tools and resources to enabling VCOs to make informed decisions on sustainable funding issues) following in September.

Reducing crime and creating a safer Dacorum

Nationwide Foundation Seeks Applications Under its Small Grants Programme **Ch**

The Nationwide Foundation which works towards a just and caring society by enabling people to take part in building better futures in their communities is currently accepting applications for funding under its Small Grants Programme. Under the programme grants of up to **£5,000** are available to registered charities with a yearly income of less than £500,000. The Small Grants Programme is part of Nationwide Foundation's Supporting Families programme and has the following aims; to promote the well-being of young men, women and children whose lives have been affected by domestic violence and to reduce the prevalence of domestic violence through increased service provision, education and awareness raising; to improve the quality of life of families with a member or members in prison, through the provision of services responsive to their needs; and to provide young people who are or have been involved with the criminal justice system with a rehabilitation programme designed to obtain the skills, confidence and personal support networks to enable them to lead fulfilled and successful lives . Previous projects funded include a grant of £5,000 towards the salary costs of a counsellor involved in the specialist support and advocacy service for women suffering domestic violence and a grant of £4,000 towards setting up workshops for women from Black and Minority Ethnic groups living in the London Borough of Newham, who are experiencing domestic abuse and difficulties in their relationships. There is no application closing date for the Small Grants Programme.

Creating a cleaner and healthier environment

Funding for Local Sustainable Energy Projects **Ch VC**

Local community groups and not for profit organisations located in England, Scotland and Wales that wish to implement sustainable energy projects in their buildings have the opportunity to apply for grants of up to **£20,000** through the E.ON Source Fund. Examples of organisations that have been funded in the past include schools, local and national charities, special education colleges and wildlife parks. Projects that can be considered for funding include the purchase and installation of one or more renewable energy technologies (e.g. wind, solar thermal, PV, wood etc); the renovation of existing facilities to incorporate micro-generation technology; an energy efficiency makeover for building that could demonstrate significant energy savings and also behavioural change amongst users; the use of new or innovative technology to deliver either energy savings or micro-generation capacity; projects which can demonstrate the intelligent use of waste energy (e.g. a

district heating system that uses waste heat from one building to heat or power another). **The next deadline for applications is the 15th May 2009.**

Time Running Out to get Green Grants Ch VC SE TP LA

The Government has announced that charities and organisations like schools and hospitals have until **June 2009** to apply for grants through the Low Carbon Buildings Programme to install green energy generating equipment like solar panels, wind turbines or biomass boilers. Through the scheme charities and public sector bodies can apply for 50% of the costs of installing small scale energy generating equipment such as solar panels, wind turbines or biomass boilers. To date 367 schools have benefitted from Low Carbon Buildings Programme funds. Not only do schools have the opportunity to cut their fuel bills by generating their own energy, but pupils can learn about climate change. For example:

- Sandwich Technology School in Kent, was given a grant of £9,000 from the Low Carbon Buildings Programme to install a wind turbine.

Homeowners can also apply for grants of up to £2,500 to help towards the cost of installing small scale energy generating equipment. Homeowners have until June 2010 to apply.

Alcohol Education and Research Council – Small Grants Programme Ch VC SE TP LA

Organisations such as community groups, universities and charities, etc are able to apply to the Alcohol Education and Research Council under its Small Grants Programme. Funding of up to £5,000 is available for projects that increase the capacity of individuals and organisations to deal with alcohol issues. Funding is available both for research and action orientated projects. The Alcohol Education and Research Council is very flexible in what is eligible for support and is looking for projects that are innovative and that make a difference. Applications can be made at any time.

Delivering lifelong learning

Equitable Charitable Trust Ch

Charitable organisations working towards educating young people, especially young people with disabilities and/or from disadvantaged backgrounds can apply for funding of up to £30,000 through the Equitable Charitable Trust. The Trustees award approximately £1 million a year and seeks to identify and support good projects that address needs not adequately met at present, including those with potential to be introduced to large numbers of schools. Grants made by the Trust fall into three broad categories:

- Education projects or services that support the learning and development of disabled children and young people in the UK;
- Education projects for disadvantaged children and young people in the UK, particularly those that support delivery of the National Curriculum or vocational learning opportunities;
- Education projects that will help increase participation in, or improve the quality of, education for disadvantaged or disabled children and young people in developing countries.

The length of funding can range from one to three years. Previously supported projects include supplementary Maths, English and Science classes for disadvantaged 5-18 year olds; education projects to reduce teenage pregnancies; capital grants for the renovation and refurbishment of facilities for children with complex needs and disabilities; and music education projects for children and

young people with profound and multiple learning difficulties. Applications can be submitted at any time and are considered on a rolling basis by the Trustees.

Crisis -Changing Lives Programme In

Crisis, the national Homeless Charity has announced that the Changing Lives Programme will re-open for application on the 25th May 2009. The Crisis Changing Lives programme provides financial awards of up to £2,500 to solitary people who are homeless or settling into a home and looking for support so that they may achieve their vocational goals. The Awards can be used for; course fees; equipment or materials for courses; tools materials and equipment to get back to work; and to set up a business. Applications can not be made by the homeless person, but rather by the support organisation providing ongoing help. This could be a key worker, someone providing guidance concerning training or employment, a housing support officer or someone like a mental health worker. The closing date for applications will be the **3rd July 2009**.

Encouraging business and local employment

Futurebuilders Consortia Fund Ch VC SE

Futurebuilders, which offers investment in the form of loans and grants to third sector organisations to help them bid for and win public contracts, recently announced the launch of its new Consortia Fund. The Consortia Fund offers a combination of loan finance and professional support specifically for consortia groups aiming to work together to win public service contracts. Consortia are defined as two or more organisations that enter into a formal agreement, or form a separate entity to jointly bid for, and deliver, public service contracts. There is no upper limit to the size of investment, but the minimum investment package is £50,000. To be eligible to apply to the Consortia Fund, the consortium must have a specific contract in mind and have the basis of the consortia structure in place and the consortium must possess the potential to win contracts to deliver public services. In addition to the Consortia Fund, Futurebuilders also invests in third sector organisations through:

- The Tender Fund which is a three year interest-free loans of between £3,000 and £50,000.
- The Small Organisation Tender Fund which provides grants of up to £15,000 to help small organisations tender successfully for specific public sector contracts;
- The Full Investment Fund, which is Futurebuilders main product and the majority of their investments are made from this Fund.

Funding for Community Shops Ch VC SE

The Village Retail Services Association in partnership with Esmee Fairbairn Foundation and Co-operative and Community Finance provide funding to new Community owned shops in rural areas of England. The funding can provide up to £40,000 per shop. This will be made up of a mix of grant and loan funding, as well as advice from the Village Retail Services Association. Eligible applicants will include community based organisations located in rural communities of not less

than 200 residents. Applications for assistance can be submitted at any time up to and including the **30th July 2009**.

Local Food Programme Ch VC SE TP

Under the Local Food Programme a total of £50 million is available over the next five years to support a range of organisations such as voluntary and community groups, health agencies including hospitals and PCTs, schools, social enterprises, Parish and Town Councils etc., to carry out a variety of food related projects to make locally grown food more accessible and affordable to local communities. Grants are currently available through two funding streams:

- The small grants scheme which makes grants of between £2,000 and £10,000;
- The main grants programme which makes grants of between £10,001 and £300,000 to support projects such as growing, processing, marketing and distributing local food; composting and raising awareness of the benefits of such activities.

Projects so far supported through the programme include:

- Wirksworth Farmers Market. The project will set up a monthly Farmers' Market in Wirksworth that will involve fresh, local produce being brought into the town and offered for sale to both tourists and local people.
- Castle High's After School Club. Castle High's After School Club consists of children and parents who are working hard to learn about different foods and the effects on the body. The group will be making a video to promote awareness and understanding between food and healthy lifestyles.
- Grow your own Grub. A.P.P.L.E.'s 'Growing Our Grub' project is a new education and growing project which will deliver food related activities to children, young people and adult volunteers.

Modernisation Fund Ch VC SE

Capacitybuilders, which is a non-departmental public body responsible for developing the capacity of the third sector within England, has announced that the first stage of the Modernisation Fund will open for applications in June 2009. The Capacitybuilders Modernisation Fund is part of the Government's £42.5 million initiative to assist third sector organisations become stronger and more resilient to the impact of the economic downturn. Capacitybuilders element of the Modernisation Fund will total £16.5 million. As part of Stage 1 of the Modernisation Fund, it is anticipated that around 1000 successful applicants will receive a bursary worth £1,000 which they can use to pay for at least two days of initial advice to explore how mergers and collaboration may help their business adapt and become more resilient to the impact of the economic downturn. Further grants of around £10,000 will be available later in the year for organisations who want to make further progress towards collaboration and/or merger. Application for stage two grants will be dependant on having accessed stage one funding. A second element of the Modernisation Fund will be managed by Futurebuilders. It is anticipated that this will open for application during the summer of 2009.

Government Seeks Ideas for New Future Jobs Fund LA Ch SE

The Department of Works and Pensions has announced that it is now seeking Expression of Interest and ideas for bids to the new Future Jobs Fund. The £1.1 Billion Future Jobs Fund is one of the measures announced by the Chancellor in his budget and will aim to create 150,000 new jobs between October 2009 and April 2011. The jobs created through the Future Jobs Fund will be paid at least at National

Minimum Wage and will be targeted primarily at 18-24 year olds, but some funding will also be available for other disadvantaged groups and unemployment hotspots. The DWP envisages that the majority of bids will come from upper tier local authorities or sub-regional partnerships and will demonstrate that all partners within the area have been involved in developing the proposals. In some circumstances there may be a case for second tier local authorities to bid for funding for their areas. Bids will need to be in line with existing locally agreed work and skills strategies and show that they do not replicate or replace existing jobs. Other large organisations such as social enterprises and voluntary sector bodies will be able to bid as long as their proposals meet the criteria set out during the bidding process. Bidding for the Fund will open shortly.

Ofcom Community Radio Fund **Ch** **VC** **SE**

The Office of Communications (Ofcom) has launched the latest bidding round under its Community Radio Fund. The Fund has been established to help fund the core costs of running a community radio station. These not-for-profit radio stations have a social purpose, and work to involve their target community in running the service. Under the fund, Community Radio Stations are being invited to apply for funding to support their core running costs. These core costs can include, management; administration, financial management & reporting, fundraising to support the station (grants and commercial funding), community outreach and volunteer organisation and support. There is no upper limit of grant that can be applied for. Grants can only be made to community radio licensees ("Licensee") which are broadcasting under a community radio licence (and not an RSL, for example). During the last bidding round 35 Community Radio Stations received grants ranging from £5,000 to £17,000. **The closing date for applications is 5 pm on the 12th May 2009.**

Heroes Return 2 Scheme **In**

The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) has announced the Heroes Return 2 Scheme is now open to applications. The Heroes Return 2 Scheme provides funding to help World War II veterans that saw active service overseas with or alongside the British Allied Armed Forces in the Second World War, and are resident in the UK or the Republic of Ireland to take part in commemorative visits (within the UK and overseas) to mark the anniversary of events that led to the end of WWII. The Heroes Return Scheme offers fixed amount grants of between £150 and £5,500 for each veteran and their spouse and/or carer towards the cost of their visit. There are five levels of funding according to the destination. Applications can be submitted at any time between the 1st April 2009 and the 31st January 2011. . MBF Young Talent Awards **In**

The Musicians Benevolent Fund (MBF) has announced that it is inviting applications from young musicians 18 years of age or under. MBF Young Talent Awards are an important source of funding for young musicians and are made to those with a high level of musical achievement where there is financial need. Awards of between £200 and £1,000 are available towards the cost of buying an instrument ; music lessons with a private teacher ; fees for a Saturday music centre; and travel expenses to

attend a Saturday music centre. Awards are also offered to those who are aged 18 and about to enter their first year at university or college. Applications from 18 year olds can only be made for instrument purchase. Last year the MBF distributed almost £90,000 through the scheme. The closing date for applications is the **12th June 2009**.

New Fund to Promote Sports in Rural Areas Ch VC SE TP LA

Sport England has announced that its new £10 million fund to create sporting opportunities for people in rural areas is now open for applications. This is the first in a series of themed funding rounds aimed at increasing community based sports. The Rural Communities Themed Round is designed to give a wide range of organisations, from local authorities to sports clubs and smaller community groups, an opportunity to develop and deliver new and innovative projects to overcome barriers to both participation and supply of sporting opportunities. Successful bids will make significant contributions to two of Sport England's strategic outcomes:

- Growing participation in grassroots sport.
- Sustaining participation by improving the quality of people's sporting experience.

The minimum grant available is £10,000, but in order to maximise the positive effect on sport in rural areas, **Sport England is explicitly encouraging high value, high impact projects**. A significant proportion of the successful bids are expected to be projects requiring National Lottery funding of more than £500,000. A detailed application prospectus for the Rural Communities Themed Round is available on Sport England's website. The closing date for applications is the **30th June 2009**.

Encouraging community involvement

The Charles Hayward Foundation Ch

Predominantly funds capital costs and occasionally, project funding may be offered for start-up or development activities where these are not part of the on-going revenue requirement of the organisation. Projects that are preventative or provide early intervention and whose area of impact is at the community and neighbourhood level are preferred. The Foundation has the following current categories: heritage and conservation; criminal justice; hospices; older people; overseas; small grant schemes of up to £5,000. Grants are only made to registered charities.

Tackling Race Inequalities Fund Ch VC SE

Third sector organisations operating across England or one of its regions that are working to tackle race inequalities are invited to apply for funding through the £6 million "Tackling Race Equality Fund". The Fund which will be available for the financial years 2009 -10 and 2010 -11 will provide funding of between £200,000 and £450,000 spread over two years to successful organisations whose work is seen as being of strategic importance. To be eligible organisations need to work within Black Asian and minority ethnic communities and be involved in one or more of the following; promoting equal opportunities; reduce inequalities; carry out research into issues relating to race equality; increasing levels of civic participation, volunteering or representation in civic or political institutions; and Working with particularly disadvantaged people within Black Asian and minority ethnic groups, including women, young people and disabled people; etc. The closing date for applications is the **27th May 2009**.

Call for proposals - Youth in Action Programme LA Ch SE VC TP

The European Commission has opened up a new call for proposals under its Youth in Action Programme (Action 3.2). Through the call for proposals the Commission seeks to support projects which promote cooperation in the youth sector between Programme Countries and partner countries other than those which are neighbours of the European Union. In particular, this action encourages exchanges and training of young people and youth workers, partnerships and networks of youth organisations as well as the exchange of good practice. Projects must involve partners from at least four different countries. Applications for funding can be submitted by non-profit organisations. These organisations can be non-governmental organisations (NGOs) or public bodies. The same applies to the partner organisations. The total budget available for this call for proposals is €2.6 million and the maximum grant per project is €100,000. The closing date for applications is the **1st June 2009**.

Funding for Rape and Sexual Violence Support Services

The LankellyChase Foundation has announced that it is seeking applications from member organisations of Rape Crisis England & Wales and the Survivors Trust who work outside the Greater London area. The funding is being made through the Foundation's Breaking Cycles of Abuse Grants Programme - Rape & Sexual Violence. The aim of the programme is to develop the capacity of member organisations and the LankellyChase Foundation expects to make around 6-10 awards each year. During 2009-2011 priority will be given to organisations with no confirmed funding and most at risk of closure in the next twelve months; and organisations with no significant statutory funding and most at risk of facing reduction in services or staff redundancies within twelve months. Eligible organisations must be registered charities, industrial and provident societies, exempt charities or Community Interest Companies that are affiliated to either Rape Crisis England & Wales or the Survivors Trust located outside of London. Children in Need Ch SE VC

Organisations working with disadvantaged young people aged 18 or under are able to apply for funding through the BBC's Children in Need Programme. Funding is available to organisations, (including schools) that work with young people who are suffering from illness, distress, abuse or neglect, are disabled, have behavioural or psychological difficulties and / or are living in poverty or situations of deprivation. The type of funding available includes both capital and revenue grants. There is no minimum or maximum amount when applying for funds from BBC Children in Need and organisations can apply for up to 100% of project costs. Previous projects funded include Home-Start Kettering Area which received a grant of £15,445 to run two support groups to work with disadvantaged children and their families on a weekly basis during term time and the Barnstaple Poverty Action Group which received a grant of £109,832 to help reduce homelessness and rough sleeping among young people through prevention, information, advice, support and emergency accommodation. Organisations wishing to apply for funding need to complete the BBC Children in Need online grant application form no paper applications will be accepted. The next application deadline is **15 July 2009**.

Improving social care and health

Tudor Trust Announces New Funding Guidelines Ch

The Tudor Trust, one of the largest independent grant making trusts in the UK has announced new funding guidelines for the period 2009 – 11. Under the new guidelines, the Trust will continue to make grants across their established funding areas. These are; youth, older people, community, relationships, housing, mental health, substance misuse, learning, financial security and criminal justice. The Trust will also be open to hearing about work in areas the Trust has not funded before. The Trust makes grants in the region of £19 million per year and aims to support smaller community, voluntary and charitable organisations and is looking to make around 350 projects per year for up to three years. Grants can take the form of core funding (including salaries and running costs), development funding, project grants or capital grants for buildings or equipment. There is no maximum or minimum grant amount that an organisation can apply for. There is a two stage application process and applications can be submitted at any time.

The Arts programme 2010 will open for application at the end of September 2009 and the first grants will be made in June 2010.
