## Extra Support During the Recession

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### **The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) – response to the recession**

BIG has recently announced that an additional £43 million is to be invested across the UK to tackle the longer-term effects of the recession on the UK's communities. BIG is working closely with stakeholders to determine what form the support will take, but it is thought it could include targeted funding for specific services such as debt advice and support to help train increasing numbers of volunteers.

Responding to the increasing pressure facing the Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS), BIG has also reprioritised and refocused its portfolio and increased the budgets of some of its most popular programmes this year, to the tune of around £45million. All these adjustments have been made to help get funding fast to where VCS voices are saying it is needed most.

The move includes a £20million increase in Reaching Communities (England), a programme through which VCS organisations can access up to £500,000 for up to five years. A £7.2 million boost to the BASIS programme will help build capacity in the sector.

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### **Hardship Fund Opens for Applications**

The Community Development Foundation, has announced that the £16.7 million Hardship Fund is now open for applications. The Hardship Fund will provide grant support to third sector organisations in England delivering front-line services to the most vulnerable and disadvantaged people in society. Grants of between £50,000 and £250,000 are available to support organisations in England with a turnover of at least £200,000 that are in financial hardship as a result of the recession, which is impacting on their ability to deliver services in the following areas; health and social care; housing support; education and training; and information, advice and guidance. Grants will be paid from October 2009 and need to be spent by September 2010. Applications can be submitted at any time during the lifetime of the fund.

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### **Free Services to VCS organisations**

A recent article in Third Sector Magazine (14<sup>th</sup> July 2009) highlighted some of the main suppliers of 'pro bono' services (supply of free services to voluntary and community organisations). Below is a copy of the list of suppliers listed in the article for your reference and use:

#### **> Charity Property Help ([www.charitypropertyhelp.com](http://www.charitypropertyhelp.com))**

A new service for registered charities set up by the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS). Charitable organisations can receive one hour of free property advice from a qualified RICS chartered surveyor.

#### **> The Glass House (<http://www.theglasshouse.org.uk>)**

Offer free design training for community groups working on regeneration projects that include play areas, open spaces, housing and community buildings. This training is delivered throughout the year and can be provided for groups locally.

**> IT4Communities** ([www.it4communities.org.uk](http://www.it4communities.org.uk))

Is a UK wide national IT volunteering programme. They can help charities, community groups and social enterprises to access free IT support from IT professional volunteers.

Their main areas of activity are:

- Helping charities and community/voluntary groups to find volunteers to help with their IT needs
- Helping IT professionals to find suitable IT volunteering opportunities
- Providing support for volunteering projects from project definition to project completion

This project provides free legal advice to small charities, not for profit, voluntary and community organisations and social enterprises using volunteer lawyers. They can help with a wide variety of legal work including company law, employment law, intellectual property law, property law, charity law; tax/VAT law; insolvency and help in drafting contingency plans; insurance law; health and safety law; general contractual / commercial matters etc. You can apply online where project staff from LawWorks will review your application and if successful will try and match you with a volunteer legal advisor who provides the legal advice for free.

## Reducing crime and creating a safer Dacorum

### Hilden Charitable Fund **Ch**

The Hilden Charitable Fund has announced that the next deadline for submitting applications is the **11th September 2009**. Within the UK, the Hilden Charitable Fund makes grants to projects that address disadvantages, notably by supporting causes which are less likely to raise funds from public subscriptions. In particular, the Fund wants to support projects that address homelessness, minorities, and penal affairs. Preference is given to supporting small community organisations with an income of less than £200,000 per year. During 2007 / 08 the value of the average grant given was £5,000.

## Creating a cleaner and healthier environment

### Government Announces Extension to Low Carbon Buildings Programme Phase 2 Programme **LA Ch TP**

Following an announcement that the Low Carbon Buildings Programme Phase 2 grants programme was to be closed at the end of June 2009, the Government has decided to extend the programme until April 2011 by investing a further £35 million into the scheme. Through this programme public sector organisations (including schools, hospitals, housing associations and local authorities) and charitable bodies can apply for grants of up to £200,000 for the installation of microgeneration technologies such as biomass boilers, air and water sourced heat pumps, hydro and wind turbines, etc. Applications to the Low Carbon Buildings Programme Phase 2 can be submitted at any time.

### Esmee Fairbairn Foundation - Food Strand

The aim of the Food strand is a £3 million funding strand over three years (2008 - 2011) with the aim of promoting an understanding of the role of food in enhancing quality of life. It will prioritise the enjoyment and experience of food rather than its production and we seek to enable as many people in the UK as possible to access, prepare and eat nutritious, sustainable food.

The Foundation are keen to support work which enhances quality of life, this will include the following:

- Improving access to appropriate, diverse and sustainable food in areas where availability is limited
- Exploring or enhancing understanding of the impact of food on wider well-being
- Demonstrating the positive role of food in a social context or how food can contribute to community cohesion

- Developing leadership in food policy and/or enabling greater connection among currently diverse food-related interests
- Scaling up effective local or regional practice that deserves a wider platform
- Strategic or exceptional work that supports the development of sustainable food systems.

The Foundation is interested in work that influences policy and practice across a range of food-related areas. The Foundation expect to support a mix of practical projects that have wide significance, and some research and policy based work.

Previously funded projects include;

- Community Food Enterprise Ltd which received a £70,000 grant towards the costs over two years of the continued operation of existing Social Food outlets and expansion of the service into new areas.
- Local Food Links Ltd, which received a grant of £99,204 towards the scale-up of the Local Food Links hot school meals service in Dorset over two years and to explore the provision of a user-led catering service for older people

### **Ecominds Announces Closing Dates** Ch SE VC

Mind, is the leading mental health charity, has announced that due to the large number of applications received by its Ecomind programme, it is now **introducing closing dates for its remaining unallocated funds**. Through the Ecominds programme, Mind will fund a range of community and voluntary groups who want to encourage people with experience of mental distress to get involved in environmental projects, such as improving open spaces and wildlife habitats, designing public art and recycling. Funding is also open to commercial organisations for projects that operate on a non commercial basis and statutory bodies working in partnership with the third sector. Launched in 2008, Ecominds had a total of £7.5 million to distribute to around 125 projects. The closing dates announced are; 12:00 noon on Friday the 30th October 2009 for large bids (£60,001 to £150,000); 12:00 noon on Friday the 8th January 2010 for Medium bids (20,001 to £60,000); and 12:00 noon on Wednesday the 30th June 2010 for Small bids (up to £20,000). Ecominds is particularly keen to encourage application for small grants which are currently not oversubscribed. To be eligible for funding projects must have both a mental health and environmental perspective; involve people with direct experience of mental distress; encourage community access, collaboration, and improve the environment and environmental sustainability; and have a budget of under £250,000.

### Grants to Help New, Innovative Visual Arts Projects **In**

The Elephant Trust offers grants to artists and institutions (priority is given to small organisations and galleries) for new, innovative visual arts projects based in the UK. The Trust's aim is to make it possible for artists and those presenting their work to undertake and complete projects when confronted by lack of funds. The Trust supports projects that develop and improve the knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the fine arts. The Trust normally awards grants of up to £2,000, but larger grants may be considered. **The next deadline for the submission of applications is 21 September 2009.**

### Non-Turf Pitch Grants

The Lord's Taverners, which aims to give young people, particularly those with special needs, an opportunity to participate in recreational cricket, has announced that funding of up to £6,000 is available in 2009 for the installation of non-turf pitches, practice ends and nets. Applicants can be England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) affiliated clubs, individual schools or other organisations directly involved in the development of youth cricket. but must be approved by the Cricket Development Manager at your local County Cricket Board. Awards do not normally exceed the following levels: non-turf match pitch (£3,000); non-turf practice ends (£2,000); and outdoor nets (£1,000). **Applications can be made at any time.**

## Encouraging community involvement

### Hertfordshire Locality Budget Scheme **Ch SE VC**

Are you a member of a local community group or charity which would benefit from a funding boost? If so, help could be close at hand in the shape of the Locality Budget scheme from Hertfordshire County Council. Each of Hertfordshire's 77 county council members has a £10,000 Locality Budget to spend on worthwhile projects in their community that promote social, economic or environmental wellbeing. Leader of Hertfordshire County Council, Robert Gordon said: "Councillors know their patch as well as anyone. We want to tap into their local knowledge to make sure that the money we have set aside to help local communities gets to the right places. "This is a great opportunity for worthwhile projects to get a welcome funding boost and for councillors to live up to their role as community champions." **Proposals must be discussed with your local county councillor before completing your application.** Visit [www.hertsdirect.org/localitybudget](http://www.hertsdirect.org/localitybudget) and complete the application form online. Application forms are also available from the local library or by calling 0300 123 4040. Once submitted, your application will be reviewed by your local county councillor who will recommend whether the grant should be awarded. A formal decision will then be made by the council's chief legal officer and you will be notified as to whether or not your request has been successful in writing or by email.

The Adventure Capital Fund (ACF), in partnership with Futurebuilders and the Community Alliance has announced the launch of the new £70 Million Communitybuilders programme. The aim of the programme is to help build more cohesive, engaged and active communities through investment in community-led organisations looking to develop long term viability. Communitybuilders is designed to help community-led organisations work towards long-term financial stability and away from grant dependency so they can continue to meet the needs of their communities for future generations. Interested organisations will be able to apply for a mixture of loans and grants and have access to expert support and mentoring services. ### **HBOS Foundation and Lloyds TSB Foundations** Ch

Following the acquisition of HBOS plc by Lloyds TSB plc on 19 January 2009 resulting in Lloyds Banking Group, a review of the new group's community investment is in progress. As one of the first changes made as a result of this review, the grant-making activities of the HBOS Foundation will be replaced by the **Lloyds TSB Foundations'** grants programmes. This ensures a simple approach, with one point of contact for charities wishing to make a grant application. There are four Lloyds TSB Foundations covering England and Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland and the Channel Islands. Please note that your organisation will need to meet the programme criteria of the relevant Lloyds TSB Foundation. To apply for a grant, charities should visit the website for the region of the UK in which they are registered, where there are also details of the charities and projects previously supported.

## Meeting the needs of children and young people

### **The Peter Cruddas Foundation** Ch

The Peter Cruddas Foundation gives priority to programmes designed to help disadvantaged and disengaged young people to pursue their education (including vocational) and more generally develop their potential whether through sport or recreation, voluntary programmes or otherwise. Preference will be given to the support of projects undertaken by charitable organisations for the benefit of such people. Consideration may be also given in certain circumstances for individual support but only on referral from appropriate sponsor organisations.

Priority funding streams for 2009:

- Pathways/support for young disadvantaged or disengaged young people into mainstream education, training or employment
- Crime diversion schemes
- Work experience/skills projects for young people
- Mentoring of young people in London
- General youth work in London

### **Youth Music to Launch New Grant Making Programme** Ch

Youth Music, the UK's largest children's music charity has announced that its grant making programme is now open for applications. Through its Open Programme, grants of between £5,000 and £30,000 will be available to support projects that provide structured, regular and progressive music-making activities for children and young people in support of Youth Music's goals of working with Early Years, Children and Young People in Challenging Circumstances, Encouraging Talent and Workforce Development. To be eligible, projects will need to work with children and young people aged 0-18 years (or up to 25 if they have special educational needs, disabilities or are in detention) and children and young people will be at the heart of the decision making for all projects. **There will be a number of funding rounds throughout the year and the first closing date for applications is the 10th August 2009.**

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### **Prime Minister Launches New Youth Leadership Fund** Ch SE VC

Gordon Brown has launched a major youth leadership programme for young people aged 13 to 19 aiming to increase the opportunities for them to lead change in their communities. The programme which is led by a partnership of charities headed by the Young Foundation has a total budget of £1 million to support organisation through two funding schemes. Grants of between £5,000 and £20,000 are available for organisations working with young people to scale up their operations or projects to the next level. The next funding deadline for Scaling Up grants will be in the Autumn. Organisations with a proven track record can also apply for a limited number of "Reaching Out" grants of between £75,000 and £100,000 to set up new projects. The next funding deadline for "Reaching Out" grants is the 20th November 2009.

### **Funding to Develop Media Skills of Disadvantaged Young People** Ch SE VC

Mediabox, a Department for Children, Schools and Families fund to enable disadvantaged 13-19 year olds living in England the opportunity to develop and produce creative media projects, using print, television, film, radio or online platforms, has announced that its **Mix Mediabox funding scheme will open for applications on the 10th August 2009.** Through its Mix Mediabox scheme, grants of between £5,000 and £20,000 are available to organisations that bring together young people from diverse economic backgrounds, faiths or geographic areas to work on a media project. This grant scheme supports projects that enable young people to work with older members of their community, to create media projects that encourage communities to gain a better understanding of each other and promote community cohesion. In addition funding is also currently available through the Mini Mediabox scheme. This provides grants of £1,000 to £5,000 and is open to grassroots and community youth organisations for youth led media projects. Previous projects supported through Mediabox includes Kent Refugee Action Network which delivered a series of animation workshops to 20 young unaccompanied asylum seekers. The project resulted in the production of four quality animation shorts that illustrate different aspects of the journey of a young person to the UK; and Media Mash Up

which received funding to give young people from very diverse backgrounds in Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Milton Keynes the opportunity to try their hands at film, print, radio and mixed media techniques.

### **Beacon Initiative - Equality and Diversity Workforce Grants** Ch SE VC

Children England, the national charity working for Children and Families has announced that it is seeking applications for funding through the Beacon Initiative - Equality and Diversity Workforce Grants scheme. The aim of the scheme which is being funded through the Children Workforce Development Council is to support projects that develop and promote innovative practice in the field of equality and diversity. The funding is available to local, sub-regional and regional voluntary and community sector service delivery organisations working with children young people and families. The maximum sum will be £2500 per organisation and there will be a total of 10 grants. **The closing date for applications is the 1st September 2009.** Successful applicants will be notified by 31 September, 2009.

## Improving social care and health

### **Third Sector Investment Programme for the Innovation, Excellence and Service Development Fund** Ch SE VC

The Department of Health has announced that the Third Sector Investment Programme for the Innovation, Excellence and Service Development Fund for 2010-11 is now open for applications. The fund which is open to voluntary organisations providing a service similar to a service provided by the National Health Service or by local authority social services aims to support the work of third sector organisations with a clear focus on supporting and driving forward new ideas, excellence and developments in health and social services. Projects that are eligible for funding under this scheme must also address one of the following cross cutting themes; information, advice, advocacy and support; personalisation and dignity; community and user involvement and peer support; promoting, supporting and maintaining positive behaviour in terms of health; and reducing inequalities in health. There is no minimum or maximum funding that organisations can apply for. However under the previous! scheme the average grant awarded was around £50,000. There is a two stage application process. **Outline proposals need to be submitted by the 4th September 2009.** Those organisations that are successful at this stage will be invited to submit detailed applications by the 27th November 2009.

### **Funding to Prevent the Misuse of Alcohol** Ch SE VC

Organisations working to tackle alcohol misuse and raise awareness about the impact of alcohol misuse in the community have the opportunity to apply for funding through the Drinkaware Trust Awareness Project Grant scheme. The main objectives of the trust is to help reduce alcohol misuse, reduce alcohol related injuries and change the drinking culture in the UK. The Awareness Project Grant scheme is

intended to help organisations develop existing and successful alcohol-awareness projects for people aged under 18 or between 25 and 44. Grants fall into 3 categories: community based work, alcohol education work and projects focusing on generating new approaches to alcohol misuse that have the potential to be rolled out to a wider audience. The Awareness Project Grants are made up to the value of £25,000 for the development of existing alcohol awareness schemes. Applications can be submitted at any time.

## Meeting the needs of older people

### Music Grants for Older People **Ch**

The registered charity, Concertina makes grants to charitable bodies which provide musical entertainment and related activities for the elderly. The charity is particular keen to support smaller organisations which might otherwise find it difficult to gain funding. Since its inception in 2004, it has made grants to a wide range of charitable organisations nationwide in England and Wales. These include funds to many care homes for the elderly to provide musical entertainment for their residents. Some of the charities that have received grants from the charity include Age Concern, Exmouth which received a grant for entertainments for the elderly in Exmouth and surrounding areas and Sue Ryder Care, Lancashire to fund access to music therapy workshops at Birchley Hall near Wigan and St Helen's. **The next application deadline is the 31st October 2009.**

## FORTHCOMING FUNDRAISING TRAINING COURSES

### Demonstrating Outcomes - September 8th or 10<sup>th</sup> London

How do you measure growth in self-esteem, put a value on independence or calibrate hope? If you work in fields such as social care, housing, health and disability, children and young people, employment, faith-based projects or international development – you will be changing lives in ways which few funders or policy makers fully appreciate.

'Demonstrating Outcomes' is an intensive, one-day workshop designed to help you demonstrate the real worth of the services which you provide and your impact on the quality of life of your beneficiaries. The training focuses primarily on how to measure 'soft outcomes' – those changes in individual capacity and quality of life, to which a crude, quantitative 'numbers count' will never do justice.

The course is presented by Nick Priggis of Action Planning, an experienced trainer who has worked for seventeen years in community development. It is limited to 20 participants and helps you apply a range of participatory evaluation tools which can show just how far your clients, volunteers and beneficiaries have come since being involved with your project. It will provide:

- an understanding of how to measure outcomes
- tools to measure 'softer' qualitative outcomes
- opportunity to test these tools
- pointers on how to use evaluation to maximise your fundraising

The participation fee is **£185** and includes VAT, all course resources and lunch.
