Reducing crime and creating a safer Dacorum

Nationwide Foundation Small Grants Programme (UK)

The Nationwide Foundation makes grants to registered UK charities (including those in Northern Ireland) which offer financial and / or housing related support to survivors of domestic abuse and older people.

The funding programmes under which the Foundation makes grants to survivors of domestic abuse and older people includes developing financial capability and fighting financial exclusion and to support housing needs.

Priority is given to:

- applications for work engaging families of beneficiaries
- applications for work which fits more than one objective (e.g. aims to address the financial and the housing issues of survivors of domestic violence / older people identified)
- work supporting those groups identified who are from deprived areas.

The maximum grant available is £5,000 and to be eligible, applicants need to be registered charities with a annual turnover of below £500,000.

Funding for Alcohol Education Projects (UK) The Drinkaware Trust "Ideas Fund" awards small grants of between £100 and £2,500 to local community (and occasionally national) initiatives designed to promote responsible drinking and reduce alcohol related harm. The Trust funds projects ranging from public education campaigns, peer-led education schemes, educational theatre work, conferences, provision for educational materials, training, workshops to other educational events. In particular the Trust welcome applications that aim to further the strategic objectives of the Trust, which are to:

- Reduce alcohol misuse amongst under-18s
- To raise awareness about long term health harms caused by hazardous or harmful levels of drinking.

The Trust accepts applications from:

- Registered charities
- Other voluntary organisations
- Statutory organisations and partnerships.

In addition the Trust also makes grants of up to £25,000 for larger projects that undertake direct, hands-on work with individuals and the community as well as grants of up to £100,000 to help larger scale projects pack a more powerful punch or reach a wider audience.

Examples of previously funded projects include:

"Party Safe" a partnership project between Rivington School and a local group called Youth Express. Young people from the latter organisation worked together to produce a ten to twenty minute DVD demonstrating the dangers of drinking to excess and showing how quickly things can get out of control.

The London Bus Theatre Company; which received funding to educate young people of South Essex on the dangers of alcohol through the medium of drama and performing arts.

National Home Safety Equipment Scheme (UK) The main focus of this new scheme is to provide home safety equipment to the most disadvantaged families in areas with the highest accident rates. 'Safe at Home' will be run by The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) **until March 2011**. RoSPA aims to work with existing and new local Home Safety Equipment Schemes in the areas with the highest accident rates. This support will take the form of information, training and the provision and fitting of home safety equipment. One of the long term objectives of Safe At Home is to promote understanding of the importance of home safety and to build the capacity of local communities to run their own schemes providing equipment and advice to families.

Women's Diversionary Fund (UK)

The Corston Independent Funders Coalition and the Ministry of Justice (MoJ) have announced the launch of The Women's Diversionary Fund, a joint £2 million programme to help transform the way women are treated by the criminal justice system. The fund will provide grants to third sector organisations to support further growth in community services for women and contribute to building the confidence of courts in alternatives to custody. The Fund will focus on service development or continuation, filling gaps and further developing services and building organisational and sector capacity. There will not be an open application process, instead third sector organisations currently delivering in this or related fields will be invited to apply.

Creating a cleaner and healthier environment

Pond Digging Fund (UK)

Biffaward has announced that the third and final round of the Pond Digging Fund will **open for applications this autumn, and will close in January 2011**. Funding is available to provide new, clean water habitat for wildlife by creating an extensive network of new ponds across the UK. To qualify for funding projects must target at least one pond-associated Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) species; include three or more ponds at one site, or a pond complex (i.e. a cluster of ponds). Single ponds may be considered depending on the target species; the landowner/manager should be eligible to receive Biffaward funding, but public access is not required; and sites should be located (i) within 10 miles of a landfill operation (current or disused) or within 25 miles of a Biffa operation

E.ON Sustainable Energy Fund (England, Scotland & Wales) E.On the power and gas generating and distributing company has announced that **the next application deadline for its Sustainable Energy Fund is the 8th October 2010**. The E.ON Sustainable Energy Fund offers grants of up to £20,000 to community groups, not-for-profit organisations and schools who wish to consider and implement sustainable energy projects in their buildings. Local Authorities can apply in partnership with community groups / schools as long as the community group takes the lead in the application process. Projects that can be considered include; the purchase and installation of one or more renewable energy technologies (e.g. wind, solar thermal, PV, wood etc); the renovation of existing facilities to incorporate micro-generation technology (e.g. the reinstatement of a watermill and the purchase of a turbine to produce hydro-electricity); an energy efficiency makeover for your building that could

demonstrate significant energy savings and also behavioural change! amongst users; and the use of new or innovative technology to deliver either energy savings or micro-generation capacity. To be eligible organisations must benefit specific groups namely: education, vulnerable people; and people in fuel poverty.

Community Renewable Energy Grants (UK) The Naturesave Trust, which was set up in 1995, to fund specific environmental and conservation projects throughout the UK and to encourage the greater adoption of sustainable development, especially within the Small and Medium Sized business community (SMEs) has announced that it now provides start up 'seed corn' grants for community renewable energy projects. The Trust are keen to help communities, in particular, that do not have the initial start up capital to undertake all the preliminary work to get to the planning stage and most importantly for the community to retain as much control as possible over the operating income once the project has been successful. Recently funded projects by the Trust include Pilling St John's Primary School which received funding towards the installation of a wind turbine at the school, providing energy and income to the school and Trees for Health which received funding from the Trust to set up green woodworking area to utilise local coppice wood in Devon.

One Planet Living Grant Scheme (UK)

Through the One Planet Living (OPL) Grant scheme, schools, community groups and charitable organisations can apply to their local B&Q store for funding to support a local community project. Projects must support at least one of the following themes; conserve nature; save energy; grow your own; and local culture and heritage. The scheme provides £50 to £250 (at retail cost) of B&Q materials, for example, pond liners, plants, peat-free compost for projects such as a pond/wildlife garden or paints labelled low or minimal VOC for redecoration projects. It is important that the project is sustainable. Thus, the materials and methods used should not cause environmental damage in the short or long-term. The final result should have a long-lasting benefit to the community. OPL Grants do not cover maintenance, so the project should be designed for easy care. Projects must be local to a store and pupils must be involved in school projects. To apply for a grant, applicants will need to contact the environmental champion or store manager at their local B&Q store to discuss project details. **Projects can apply for funding between 1 February 2010 and 30 September 2010 and successful projects must collect their materials no later than 31 October 2010.**

European Local Energy Assistance Grant (UK) The European Commission and the European Investment Bank (EIB) have launched a new €15 million grant aid initiative to help local and regional authorities accelerate their investments in energy efficiency and renewable energy projects. Known as the European Local Energy Assistance (ELENA) facility this grants programme will fund technical assistance such as feasibility and market studies, structuring of programmes, business plans, energy audits, preparation of tendering procedures and contractual arrangements; etc that will help cities and regions in Europe bring forward viable investment projects in the areas of energy efficiency; renewable energy sources and sustainable urban transport. ELENA covers up to 90% of eligible costs required for technical support related to a clearly identified investment programme. In general projects need to be in excess of €50 million. Small projects can be supported when they are integrated

into larger investment programmes. In principle proposals can be submitted and funding agreements signed, until the end of 2011, except if the amount allocated to the ELENA facility has been exhausted before that time. **There will be no calls for proposals and assistance will be granted on a first-come first-served basis.** <http://www.eib.org/about/press/2009/2009-255-european-commission-and-european-investment-bank-launch-european-local-energy-assistance-elena-facility.htm>

Boiler Scrappage Scheme (England) The Boiler Scrappage Scheme is one of the Energy Saving Trust's programmes open to 125,000 householders in England living in an owned or privately rented home, giving them £400 off a new A-rated boiler or renewable heat technology, when they scrap the old, inefficient G-rated boiler. To be eligible for this scheme; householders (including tenants) under 60 must be scrapping a boiler that is in working order and is the main boiler used to heat the home; householders (including tenants) that are 60 and over can apply for the scheme regardless of whether the boiler they are scrapping is in working order, however it must still be the main boiler used to heat the home. Homeowners, and those that rent from private landlords and are in receipt of certain benefits, may also be eligible for a grant of up to £3,500 (or £6,000 where oil, low carbon or renewable technologies are recommended) under the Warm Front Scheme. Delivering lifelong learning

Learning in Communities Award (England)

UnLtd have teamed up with the National Institute of Adult Continuing Education (NIACE) to offer one individual the chance to receive a Learning In Communities Award of up to £5,000 to establish a project to engage adults in learning. The award is open to individuals or informal groups living in England who have an innovative idea to get adults in the community back into learning. This award is being promoted as part of their Sign Up Now campaign, motivating adults to sign up for learning opportunities during September's enrolment activity. **The award opens for applications on the 1st September 2010 and closed on the 3rd December 2010.** Five shortlisted applications will be posted onto the UnLtd website in January 2011 where the public will vote for one Award Winner. The Winner will be announced by February 4th 2011

Home Access Grants (England)

Home Access, which is a government drive that helps low-income families who currently lack access to a computer and/or internet to get online at home to support learning, has announced that due to the success of the programme that they are now only inviting applications for computers for children with profound disabilities or Special Educational Needs. Home access is available to families in receipt of certain benefits that have a child of between 3 and 9 years who attends a state-maintained school in England full time; who has not already had a computer from a Home Access Grant or similar programme, such as Computers for Pupils and who has a Statement of Special Educational Needs, or receives a Disability Living Allowance, or whose school/local authority representative can certify they have Assistive Technology needs. Organisation such as schools, charities or a local authorities can sign up to gain access to the Home Access partner area where they can download posters, leaflets and other marketing materials to help them promote Home Access in their community

Senior Volunteering Opportunities in Adult Education (UK)

Organisations working in Adult Education and Lifelong Learning that are interested in setting up a senior Volunteering project with a European Partner Organisation will be able to apply for funding in early 2011 under the Grundtvig Programme's Senior Volunteering scheme. Grundtvig, which is part of the EU's Lifelong Learning Programme funds training opportunities for adult education organisations, staff and learners. Senior Volunteering projects funding aim to build a lasting collaboration with another European organisation around a specific theme or activity or target group, through the exchange of volunteers. Organisations can send senior adult learners (aged 50+) to spend 3-8 weeks as volunteers at your partner's organisation in another country. You will also host the volunteers they send. The volunteers can be involved in any non-profit making activities, so long as they provide good learning opportunities. The Britannia Building Society Foundation - Community Fund (UK)

Registered Charities and Schools, working within education and who are seeking funding specifically for numeracy and/or - financial literacy projects can apply to the Britannia Building Society Foundation for grants of between £1,000 and £25,000. Over the last six years the Foundation has made grants totaling £3 million. Applications can be submitted at any time and there is a simple application form which is available on request by e-mailing charitable.foundation@britannia.co.uk or telephoning on 01538 391734. In addition voluntary groups, charities and schools can apply for grants of up to £1,000 through the Britannia Community Fund. The Fund also supports individual members wishing to achieve personal development goals that support the fund's our key priorities with a donation of up to £100. The Community Fund will support any voluntary organisation, school or charity working within Foundations key priorities of numeracy and/or - financial literacy, that operate within a local community where the Building Society has a high density of members. Whilst the Britannia Community Fund focuses on buying specific items or equipment, eg educational toys, books, it will also support small projects in support of their key priorities.

Grundtvig Preparatory Visits (UK)

Grundtvig is a European Union programme that funds training opportunities for UK adult education organisations, staff & learners. UK organisation involved in non-vocational adult education that want to meet partners prior to submitting a Grundtvig Partnership or Senior Volunteering application, or to attend a Contact Seminar to find new partners. Grundtvig Partnerships offer you the opportunity to work with other European organisations and co-operate on a particular theme related to adult education. Partnerships enable you to involve both your staff and learners in a European project. Senior Volunteering projects funding will help you build a lasting collaboration with another European organisation around a specific theme or activity or target group, through the exchange of senior volunteers (aged 50 or over). Organisations wishing to undertake a Preparatory Visit can apply for funding of up to €1,000. An example of a preparatory visit was from Gingerbread Northern Ireland who used a Preparatory Visits grant to visit potential project partners in Belgium. They met to discuss a collaborating on a Grundtvig Learning Partnership. Organisations must submit their funding application to the UK National Agent (ECOTEC) at least 8 weeks before the activity start date and the **final deadline for 2010 applications is 10 December 2010.**

Leonardo da Vinci - Preparatory Visits Grants (UK)

Vocational Education and Training providers as well as Schools and Colleges engaged in Vocational Education and Training that wish to get involved in the European Union's Leonardo Da Vinci Programme can apply for funding under the Preparatory Visits Grant element of the Programme. The Leonardo Da Vinci programme is part of the European Commission's Lifelong Learning Programme and aims to build a skilled workforce through European partnerships. The Programme funds overseas work placements and the development of training materials with the objective of improving the provision of Vocational Education and Training (VET) across Europe. The aim of Preparatory Visits Grants is to enable potential applicants and participants to meet European partners prior to submitting a Leonardo Da Vinci project. The maximum grant available for a preparatory visit is €1,000. Applications must be submitted at least 8 weeks before the activity start date and the **final deadline for applications is the 10th December 2010.**

Paul Hamlyn Foundation Education and Learning Programme (UK) The Paul Hamlyn Foundation is currently accepting applications under its Education and Learning programme. In particular, the Foundation is looking to fund projects that address the themes of supplementary education and developing speaking and listening skills for 11-19 year olds. Eligible organisations that can apply for funding include charities, local authorities individual pre-schools, schools, out-of-school clubs, supplementary schools, colleges and youth clubs if they demonstrate benefits to the wider community and include partnership working that will result in increasing access to education and learning to all communities and age groups. The costs that can be covered by the Foundation's grants include running costs such as staff salaries and overheads such as stationery, rent, rates and utilities.

Recent grants awarded include:

£80,700 (over 3 years) to the Polegate and Willingdon Schools' Federation for a cross-phase initiative to raise standards, improve attendance and reduce exclusions across and beyond a formal federation of two primary schools and one secondary school.

£108,260 (over 3 years) to the Black Families Education Support Group to fund a supplementary school and mentoring project for Black and Minority Ethnic children and young people aged 10-18.

Better Net Awards (UK) UnLtd together with Nominet Trust, have launched The Better Net Awards, a new programme aimed at providing individuals and groups with support and funding to develop and lead internet based solutions to the problems

that affect our society. Grants of up to £5,000 will be available. For those who have an established project with wide reach or demonstrate long-term potential, may be eligible for up to £15,000. To be eligible projects must be original and innovative and meet at least one of the following themes:

- increase education about the internet & information technology
- promote and address online safety
- provide an internet based solution to social, educational, health and environmental issues
- increase digital inclusion and the use of new media for a social purpose.

Partnership Grants Scheme for Primary and Secondary Schools (UK) The Royal Society has announced that the Partnership Grants will re-open open for applications on the 6th September 2010. Through the scheme grants of between £250 and £3,000 will be available to support teachers, scientists and engineers help develop science projects. The aim is to make the teaching of science more interesting within primary and secondary schools. The Partnership grants scheme forms partnerships to allow teachers to increase their scientific knowledge and to give scientists and engineers the chance to develop their communication skills and engage with enquiring young minds. Any UK primary or secondary school teacher or practising scientist/engineer can apply as long as the students involved in the project are between 5 and 18. Applications must be made together with the partner, and need to be signed by the teacher, partner and schools' headteacher. Examples of previously funded projects include; St Michael on the Mount Primary School received a grant of £21,050 to help pupils to learn about the human body by constructing a 15 foot skeleton. Working with engineers from Airbus UK, every class constructed a working model of their particular body part, giving the pupils the opportunity to apply some of the scientific principles they had discovered and Netheard High School, Dereham (Norfolk) received £2,488 for 'Our Star'. The project gave the whole school the opportunity to explore the solar system at first hand. **The closing date for applications will be the 5th November 2010.** <http://royalsociety.org/Partnership/>

Funding for Joint Curriculum Projects with French Schools (England) The British Council is currently seeking applications for funding from primary / secondary state schools and sixth form colleges in England which have an established partnership with a school in France. Schools can apply jointly with a neighbouring school if the nature of the project lends itself to inter-school co-operation. Funding of £4000 is available to undertake a joint curriculum project with the French partner school. Projects should be innovative, creative and involve joint activities with the French school while being fully embedded into the curricula of both schools; should

ensure regular and necessary communication takes place between pupils and staff from both schools, and work towards a concrete collaborative outcome; must include a visit to the partner country. Activities undertaken during the visit should be strictly linked to the project; and projects should aim to have a wide impact within the school and local community and should show an element of partnership sustainability. **Visits must take place between April 2010 and March 2011.**

Further Funding For Regenerative Medicine Research And Development (UK)

The Technology Strategy Board has announced that it is to invest a further £6 million, and is inviting British companies to bid for funding through two new competitions that will open on the 8th March 2010. As part of a £21.5 million programme in regenerative medicine, £4 million will be invested in commercial research and development projects in regenerative medicine therapeutics, and £2 million in feasibility projects in regenerative medicine tools and technologies. The aim of the Developing Therapeutics competition is to enable UK businesses to carry out preclinical and clinical development of regenerative medicine therapeutic products; this will enable consortia to accelerate product development to take advantage of future market or funding opportunities. And the aim of the Tools and Technology Feasibility Studies is to enable UK businesses to address challenges currently being faced by developers of regenerative medicine therapeutics through the development of platform technologies.

Research Funding for SMEs (UK) The Eurostars Programme, which is the first European funding and support programme to be specifically dedicated to Small and Medium sized Enterprises (SMEs) has announced that the next application deadline is the 30th September 2010. Under Eurostars funding is available to SMEs to undertake research and development in any technological area, but must have a civilian purpose and be aimed at the development of a new product, process or service. Eurostars supports collaborative projects involving at least two participants (legal entities) from two different Eurostars participating countries. In addition, the main participant must be a research-performing SME. Eurostars will support projects that are market-driven and that have a maximum duration of three years. In addition projects must be within two years of completion and ready for launch onto the market. The exception to this rule applies to biomedical or medical projects, where clinical trials must be started within two years of project completion.

- Home Matters - which aims to address housing issues and homelessness among vulnerable groups in the UK. In particular support survivors of domestic abuse to live independently and achieve improved quality of life; and to support older people with their housing needs.

Support for Young People Starting Up in Business (England, Scotland and Northern Ireland)

Young people wishing to start up their own business may be able to apply for funding and other support measures through the Prince's Trust Business Programme. The programme can provide support to young people who are; aged 18-30; unemployed or working less than 16 hours a week; and living in England or Northern Ireland. The type of support available includes a low interest loan of up to £4,000 (up to £5,000 for a partnership); ongoing advice from a business mentor; access to a wide range of products and services. This includes a free legal helpline, sponsored by Barclays; a grant of up to £1,500 in special circumstances (subject to local availability); and a test marketing grant of up to £250 (subject to local availability). Young people in Scotland aged 18-25 may be eligible. **Applications to the programme can be made at any time.**

BIG's Community Wildlife Fund (UK)

The BIG Lottery Fund has announced the launch of its new Community Wildlife Fund. Through the fund not for profit groups, local councils, schools and health bodys can apply for funding of between £300 and £10,000 for projects that will bring together local people to discover, enjoy or protect wildlife in their local area by improving rural or urban environments for people to enjoy, and by getting people more active and healthier.

For National Science and Engineering Week 2011, BIS (Department for Business Innovation and Skills) are providing funds for a number of schools in challenging circumstances to organise their own science and engineering events as part of the Week. The aim of the National Science and Engineering Week kick-start fund for schools, as set by BIS, is to widen access to science, engineering and technology activities to schools in challenging circumstances. The fund is open to any state school within the UK and schools must fall into at least one or more of the eligibility criteria. Priority will be given to schools that either meet more than one of the criteria or can provide a strong case for falling well within a single criterion. In order to distribute the fund to as many deserving schools as possible, the award for all successful applicants has been set at £200

Young Persons Volunteering Fund (England, Scotland and Wales)

The Sita Trust has announced the next funding round of its new Young Person's Volunteering Fund. Through this new fund, the SITA Trust can provide grants of up to £10,000 for volunteering projects owned by 14-25 year olds. The SITA Trust can support projects in any of 90 funding zones around qualifying waste processing sites operated by their donor, SITA UK. This fund has been created to assist young people aged 14-25 to volunteer their time to create or enhance facilities that can be enjoyed by the wider community. STEM Challenge 4 To Be Launched In September (UK)

Playground Partnerships Awards Will Re-open For Applications In September (UK)

The Trustees award approximately £1 million a year and seeks to identify and support good projects that address needs not adequately met at present, including those with potential to be introduced to large numbers of schools. Grants made by the Trust fall into three broad categories. Education projects or services that support the learning and development of disabled children and young people in the UK; Education projects for disadvantaged children and young people in the UK, particularly those that support delivery of the National Curriculum or vocational learning opportunities; and Education projects that will help increase participation in, or improve the quality of, education for disadvantaged or disabled children and young people in developing countries. The length of funding can range from one to

three years. Previously supported projects include supplementary Maths, English and Science classes for disadvantaged 5-18 year olds; education projects to reduce teenage pregnancies; capital grants for the renovation and refurbishment of facilities for children with complex needs and disabilities; and music education projects for children and young people with profound and multiple learning difficulties. **Applications can be submitted at any time and are considered on a rolling basis by the Trustees**

Government Restricts Free Computer Programme (England)

The Government has announced that due to the success of the Home Access Programme, only 15,000 grants are left to award. Funding to Support to Youth Workers Mobility and Exchanges (UK)

Partnership Grants Scheme for Primary and Secondary Schools (UK)

The Royal Society has announced that the latest round of its Partnership Grants scheme next round **will open on the 6th September 2010 and close on the 5th November 2010**. More than £165m to Support Home Adaptations for Disabled People (England)

The Government has granted over £165m to help local councils pay for adaptations that will enable disabled people to live comfortably and independently in their own homes. The Disabled Facilities Grant programme will help around 40,000 people with disabilities make improvements to their homes, thereby improving their everyday lives and allowing them to avoid the turmoil and costs of moving house. The grant can be used for a wide variety of adjustments that will make life easier for disabled people, including severely disabled ex-Service personnel. Acceptable types of work include: widening doors and installing ramps providing or improving access to rooms and facilities - for example, by installing a stair lift or providing a downstairs bathroom; adapting heating or lighting controls to make them easier to use; improving or providing a suitable heating system; providing suitable bathroom or kitchen facilities and improving access to and movement around the home to enable individual to care for another person who lives in the property, such as a child..

Extra Funding To Reward Children Walking To School (England) Living Streets, a national charity that stands up for pedestrians, and rewards children who walk to school has announced that they have received £800,000 funding boost from the Government for their scheme 'Walk Once a Week'. The extra funding will be used to expand the scheme to at least 900 more schools with a focus on the West Midlands, Greater Manchester, Merseyside, and Tyne and Wear. 'Walk Once a Week' since it began to run six years ago, operates in every London borough and has seen fifty-nine per cent of girls and sixty per cent of boys in participating schools take part in the scheme and walk to school at least one day a week. The scheme supports the Government's Walk4Life campaign, part of our national Change4Life movement helping families to 'eat well, move more and live longer.'

Developing Community Cohesion

Funding to Promote Financial Inclusion (UK)

The Friends Provident Foundation makes grants of up to £200,000 to not-for profit organisations for projects that address financial exclusion within disadvantaged communities. The funding is distributed through the Financial Inclusion Programme 2009-2012. The Foundation will consider applications for work that will make a strategic contribution to the overall outcome of financial inclusion in the UK. The Foundation will consider requests for capital or revenue funding, core funds or project costs. The Foundation is willing to consider applications from any type of legally independent organisation, but can only support work that is legally charitable. Actions previously supported through the Foundation include; making money management advice available to young people via mobile phones and interactive digital TV; a research project to look at the difficulties that people with a learning disability are having in gaining access to banking services. The next closing date for applications is the **22nd October 2010**

Reaching Communities (England)

The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) has announced that it is accepting applications to their Reaching Communities Programme. Reaching Communities provides grants of 10,000 - £500,000 for projects that help people and communities who are most in need, and can really make a difference. BIG wants to fund projects that respond to needs identified by communities and those that fund projects that help those most in need including those people or groups who are hard to reach.

Organisations that can apply for funding include; registered charities; voluntary or community groups; statutory bodies, (including schools); charitable or not-for-profit companies. The budget for Reaching Communities will be at least £100 million each year until 2013.

The type of projects supported in the past have included a learning bus to reach hard to reach learners in Nottingham and a project that teaches young people in Hackney, Islington and the City of London to play a range of musical instruments.

Cracking the Code Open To Applications (England)

Cracking the Code is a bursary scheme for infrastructure organisations based in England to improve their governance based on all or any of the principles of the Good Governance: a Code for the Voluntary and Community Sector. They will provide up to £500 per organisation to improve its governance based on all or any of the principles of the 'Code'. What you do and how you use the bursary depends on the needs of your organisation, but a case study and a method to share your knowledge and experiences with others in your local area will need to be developed. Organisations that have used the Cracking the Code bursary to improve their governance include:

- Diabetes UK
- Voluntary Arts Network
- Grayrigg Coronation Hall.

The deadline for applications is the 30th September 2010.

Funding for Individual and Small Groups to Improve their Local Communities (UK)

Groups of individuals as well as small community and voluntary groups within the UK that want to improve their communities can apply for funding through the Wakeham Trust. The Trust are particularly interested in supporting neighbourhood projects, community arts projects, projects involving community service by young people, or projects set up by those who are socially excluded. The Trust also support innovative projects to promote excellence in teaching (at any level, from primary schools to universities), though we never support individuals. The Trust normally gives grants to projects where an initial £75 to £750 can make a real difference to getting the project up and running.

To be eligible, applicants need to be registered charities or have access to a registered charity that will be willing to accept funds on their behalf.

The type of activities supported in the past include;

- A grant of £350 to a group of elderly and disabled volunteers to enable them to open a café for children where they can meet friends and have a bite to eat. The café was situated in the poorest area of town; it had to relocate because the previous building didn't have access to drains that could support a disabled toilet. The money was used to buy books, CDs and videos for a reading corner and a TV/video room. Additional money was raised through their charity shop and raffles.
- A grant of £200 was given to buy tools and equipment for a community garden in Kings Cross, London. The plot was rescued by the local community when attempts were made to sell it for office space in 1981. The garden offers horticulture therapy for adults with special needs, the elderly, a children's gardening club and children's plots.

The Pilgrim Trust (UK)

The Pilgrim Trust has announced that the priorities for their Social Welfare programme have changed. Through this programme the trust aims to break cycles of dependency and to help develop a sense of social inclusion in disadvantaged or marginalised groups within the UK. The fund aims to support projects:

- That support people who misuse drugs and alcohol
- In prisons and projects that provide alternatives to custody.

Grants of up to £5,000 will be rewarded through their small grants scheme, and grants over £5,000 through their main grant fund. The Pilgrims Fund also provides funding for projects that seek to conserve historical buildings, monuments and collection, and also projects that promote awareness either by making collections more available or supporting academic research, through their Preservation & Scholarship programme.

Church and Community Fund (England)

Under the Church and Community Fund grants of up to £10,000 are available to community projects run by parish churches, deaneries, dioceses and other bodies connected to or working in partnership with the Church of England. Projects supported must promote, aid and further the work of the Church of England. This does not exclude Anglican projects in partnership with ecumenical or other-faith partners, which are warmly welcomed, but it does exclude projects run by secular bodies which have little or no connection to the Church of England, overseas projects and projects in which an Anglican body is not a key player at a local level. Typical projects supported by the CCF might include; employing a youth worker; renovating an old church hall for use as a community centre; providing hot meals for the homeless in a church room. **The next application deadline is the 30th September followed by the 31st December.**

£1 Million Fund To Help Faith Groups Have Their Voices Heard (England)

The Government has announced a new £1m fund to help faith groups get their voices heard by Government and public bodies and help play their part delivering public services. The Faith Leadership in Government will make grants of up to £30,000 to national organisations that can show a track record of representing and having real roots in their communities, of working with government, and of having a real contribution to make. The Fund will open to applications in summer 2010. The Government also announced the launch of the £50,000 Innovation in Faith-based Social Action Prize this summer. A top prize of £15,000 will be available to the most innovative social action project, and three runners up prizes of £5,000. There will also be four prizes of £1,000 for the best examples in each of the five different categories which are:

- Independent projects (i.e. not already receiving public funding)
- Projects delivered with funding support from a local authority
- Advocacy and community development projects
- Multi faith projects
- Youth projects.

Projects can nominate themselves, or be nominated by others. Expressions of interest should be sent to InnovationPrize@communities.gsi.gov.uk.

Support for Community-Owned Pubs Announced (England) The Government has announced a new pilot support programme to help local communities to set up and run community-owned pubs. The support programme, is part of a 12 point action plan announced by the Government to give practical support to community pubs up and down the country. The £3.3m programme will provide grants to communities matched with loans from Co-operative and Community Finance and a contribution from the communities themselves. Alongside funding, the programme will provide a range of advice and support to communities to help them through the process of setting up a community-owned pub. The Community-Owned Pubs Programme, led by the Plunkett Foundation and developed with the Office of the Third Sector, will be delivered in partnership with a range of organisations with direct experience of supporting pubs and enabling community-ownership including Pub is the Hub, Co-operative and Community Finance, Co-operatives UK, CAMRA and the Co-operative Development Network. Faith in Action Fund Round 2 Opens for Applications (England)

The Community Development Foundation has announced that a second funding round for its Faith In Action Programme is now open for applications. Faiths in Action is a £2 million grants programme sponsored by Communities and Local Government and administered by the Community Development Foundation that is open to faith, inter faith, voluntary and community sector organisations at national, regional and local levels in England. The aim of the fund is to support the government's aspiration to help faith communities and others to promote understanding, dialogue and develop strong and sustainable partnerships. The Fund is particularly keen to support projects that focus on the inclusion and participation of women and young people and those which involve partnerships between one or more organisations. Faiths in Action supports delivery of the Government document, Face to Face and Side by Side. All applications must therefore directly relate to one or more of the fund's four priorities which are derived from this framework. These are; developing the confidence and skills to "bridge" and "link" ; supporting shared spaces for interaction and social action; developing structures and processes which support dialogue and social action; and improving opportunities for learning which build understanding. The maximum grant available is £6,000 and **applications can be submitted at any time.**

General Grant Making Bodies

New Fund for Rural Communities (UK)

A new fund has been launched to help improve the long-term sustainability of the British countryside. The Prince's Countryside Fund inspired by The Prince of Wales's aims to raise money from a wide range of businesses and their consumers to help improve the long-term sustainability of the British countryside and its rural communities.

The Fund will provide grants for up to three years to support projects that:

- Improve the sustainability of British farming in areas of deprivation;
- That improve the sustainability of rural communities;
- Reconnect people with the countryside.

Funding is available for both capital and revenue funding. Applicants can be, but do not need to be, charities. All applicants must however be able to clearly demonstrate a significant level of public benefit arising from their activities (which fulfil the Fund's charitable objects). The Prince's Countryside Fund has identified the three initial projects it will support and is likely to announce the next funding round later this year.

Moto Trust Community Grant Scheme (England, Scotland & Wales)

Local charities and community groups that are located within the employment catchment area of one of the 49 Moto Service stations (25 mile radius) may be eligible to apply for funding through the Moto Trust's Community Grant Scheme.

Although there is no minimum or maximum grant size, the Trust has indicated that it is unlikely to support any applications above £10,000. In order to apply for a Grant, you should contact the relevant Moto Service Area to introduce your organisation. The General Manager of the Moto location will submit an application to the Trustees if the project/cause meets the criteria set by the Trust. The General Manager must agree that the project/cause is strongly supported by Moto people and can offer opportunities for Moto people to offer physical as well as the financial assistance of the Trust. Preference will be given to projects which have a long term relationship with Moto, for example schools or community groups which Moto has a relationship with. Grants are approved by the Trustees every three months.

The Archer Trust (UK)

The Archer Trust is a UK Christian charitable grant-making trust, that aims to support small UK charities that help people with physical or mental disabilities or people facing disadvantage. Preference will be given to those organisations working in areas of high unemployment and deprivation. The trust will fund projects in the UK and overseas (only via UK charities which can ensure that funds are being well used). The grants available range from £250 - £3,000. Applications can be made at any time. Trustees meet twice a year, normally in **March and September to consider applications.**

Tesco Charity Trust Community Awards (UK)

The Tesco Charity Trust has announced that it will start accepting applications for projects that support the Elderly and Adults and Children with disabilities from the 1st August until the 30th September 2010. The funding is available to community and voluntary groups who can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £5,000. The Tesco Charity Trust has been in existence since 1987 and aims to provide approximately £600,000 in grants each year. Previous projects supported have included:

- part funding to purchase minibuses;
- befriending schemes;
- luncheon clubs;
- day trips / social trips - for elderly / disabled people.

In addition the Trust also provides grants for projects that support children's education and welfare.

Applications to support projects that support children's education and welfare will re-open for applications on the 1st December 2010 and will **close for applications on the 31st January 2011.**

The Woodward Charitable Trust (UK)

The Woodward Charitable Trust, which is one of the Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts, is inviting applications from UK registered charities working with or in the areas of:

Peoples Postcode Trust (Scotland & England)

The People's Postcode Trust, a trust set up by the "People's Postcode Lottery" in April 2009, has announced that their next funding round will open for applications on the 7th June 2010. Funding of between £500 and £10,000 (£2,000 if not a registered charity) is available to small organisations and community groups operating in the areas of Poverty Prevention; Advancement of Health; Community Development; Public Sports; Human Rights; and Environmental Protection. Projects supported can last for up to 3 months. Previous projects supported include Bishopton Village Nursery which received a grant of £825 to support children's learning and Scottish Native Woods, an organisation that exists to rescue, restore and expand Scotland's native woods- woodlands that are natural to Scottish landscape. The organisation received a grant of £9,958 to thin out trees, reinstate and repair paths and reinstall drainage systems.

Tudor Trust Grants Programme (UK) The Tudor Trust, one of the largest independent grant making trusts in the UK has announced new funding guidelines for the period 2009 – 11. Under the new guidelines, the Trust will continue to make grants across their established funding areas. These are; youth, older people, community, relationships, housing, mental health, substance misuse, learning, financial security and criminal justice. The Trust will also be open to hearing about work in areas the Trust has not funded before. The Trust makes grants in the region of £19 million per year and aims to support smaller community, voluntary and charitable organisations and is looking to make around 350 projects per year for up to three years. Grants can take the form of core funding (including salaries and running costs), development funding, project grants or capital grants for buildings or equipment. There is no maximum or minimum grant amount that an organisation can apply for. **Applications can be submitted at any time.**

Founded in 1958 the Garfield Weston Foundation is a UK based, general grant- giving charity that makes grants in the areas of the Arts, Community Education, Medical, Environment, Health, Religion, Welfare and Youth. Applications are considered individually by the Foundation and the following issues are taken into consideration: The financial viability of the organisation; The degree of need for the project requiring funding; The amount spent on administration and

fundraising as compared to the charitable activities; The ability to raise sufficient funding to meet the appeal target; Whether the organisation has appropriate priorities and plans in place to manage its activities. There is no limit on the size of grant.

There are no formal deadlines for submitting applications and organisations should allow approximately four months for a final outcome.
