A3 - Gadebridge Park

Gadebridge Park sits between Hemel Hempstead Old Town and the Leighton Buzzard Road. The park includes many attractions such as the Splash Park, play areas and outdoor fitness centre.



These replica sculptures were gifted to Hemel Hempstead by the new town of Elizabeth in South Australia. In return they received a copy of Rock and Roll.

(19) E5 - Boxmoor

Boxmoor is one of Hemel local centres and comprises mainly 19th-century housing and meadowland. The Box Moor Trust manages almost 500 acres of agricultural and amenity land. The estate comprises a variety of different environments, including watermeadows, chalk downland, woods, pastures, chalk streams, old clay workings and recreational land.



A3 - St Mary's Church

The church is the parish church of the town and its oldest place of worship. The Church is a Grade I listed building and contains a memorial to Sir Astley Paston Cooper. A spire, one of the tallest in Europe, was added in the 14th century with a total height of 200 feet. It is topped by a gilded weather vane.



C3 - Jellicoe Water Gardens

In 1957 Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe was asked to design a new town centre park, transforming an area of orchards, watercress beds and ironworks. Jellicoe based his design on a serpent, channelling the River Gade to bring visitors closer to water and nature. Opened in 1962, the Gardens are a rare post-war Modernist landscape and one of Jellicoe's most intact schemes.



C3 - Waterplay statue

This artwork is located in the Marlowes and in the summer months the fountain is turned on and visitors can be seen playing in the fountains.



(20) E2 - The River Bulbourne

The Bulbourne River is a key feature of the Moors and is one of only 210 chalk streams in the world. Hemel streams of the river have characteristic features that support special wildlife habitats and species, thanks to a combination of geology and climate.



A3 - Walled Gardens

The Walled Garden is the location of the original Bury House. The Walled Garden is sometimes also known as the Charter Gardens, after the stone porchway leading to the gardens. The name "Charter Tower " derives from a local myth that Henry VIII may have stayed there in 1539 and handed down Hemel Hempstead's Royal Market Charter from the upper window as a mark of gratitude for hospitality received.



(9) C3 - Bank Court

Within the Marlowes, there is Bank Court which was the financial area of the new Town. The buildings are a good example of new Town architecture and have a strong relationship with the Water Gardens just on the other side of the river.



C3 - Residents rainbow sculpture

This sculpture was erected in 1993 to symbolise the optimism and aspirations of the first people to settle in the New Town after the Second World War.



(21) G1 - Apsley Marina

Apsley Marina is in a prime location on the Grand Union Canal, offering residential, leisure & visitor moorings and a lively marina for residents & visitors alike.



A3 - The Bury

The Bury was erected in about 1790 and it is a Grade II* listed building. It was the residence for the next two centuries of many notable people the Ginger family and the Grover family.

can see the town names illustrat-

This sculpture was commissioned for the Water Gardens and created by the French sculptor Hubert Yencesse. It was positioned on the lake so that the figures appear as if they are dancing on the surface of the water.



D3 - A point of reflection sculpture





Striking graffiti murals located in the underpass close to Paradise







Situated in the heart of the old High Street, Hemel Hempstead, The Old Town Hall is a Grade II* building. The Old Town Hall has een a buzzing arts space since 1978, hosting famous faces from the world of comedy, to showcasing the work of emerging and critically acclaimed performers.



B3 - The River Gade along Waterhouse Street
